We'll support you throughout the process, including helping you enrol in your course at Federation University TAFE.

Enrolled Nurse Traineeship

We offer a Diploma of Nursing Traineeship to support individuals who are interested in becoming an Enrolled Nurse!

Program Overview

Two traineeship programs are offered:

- Ballarat region
- Wimmera region (including Horsham, Stawell, Dimboola and Edenhope)

This is a two-year, fixed-term program where trainees are employed by Grampians Health for 32 hours per week while completing their Diploma of Nursing with Federation University TAFE. The program combines classroom learning with hands-on experience, giving you the opportunity to build skills in real healthcare environments.

Who Can Apply?

We welcome applications from:

- School leavers
- Mature aged students
- Individuals looking to change careers
- Qualified Healthcare Workers (HCWs), Personal Care Assistants (PCAs) or Personal Care Workers (PCWs)

Program Structure

- Duration: 2 years (fixed term)
- Employment: 32 paid hours per week, including annual leave entitlements
- Schedule: 3 days classroom-based learning + 2 days in the workplace
- Supernumerary support: First 6 months of employment include additional support as you settle in

Course Delivery

- Delivered by Federation University TAFE
- Learning methods include face-to-face classes, online learning (MS Teams), lab sessions, and blended delivery
- Course includes 20 Core Units and 5 Elective Units
- Clinical placements: 440 hours across aged care, acute, subacute, and mental health settings – all within Grampians Health campuses

Pathways After the Program

At the end of the traineeship, we encourage you to apply for other roles within Grampians Health. Many graduates go on to secure employment as Enrolled Nurses or pursue further studies in nursing or other healthcare fields.

Health Care Worker Traineeship

We also offer a Health Care Worker Traineeship designed to support individuals in starting a career in personal care and support services. This is a structured program combining work and study to prepare trainees for a range of roles in the healthcare sector.

Program Overview

Traineeship programs are available across:

- Ballarat
- Wimmera region – including Horsham, Stawell, Dimboola and Edenhope

Trainees are employed by Grampians Health and enrolled in the Certificate III in Individual Support with Federation University TAFE. The program provides the skills and experience needed to support people in aged care, disability, or community settings.

Who Can Apply?

We welcome applications from:

- School leavers
- Mature aged students
- Individuals looking to change careers

Program Structure

- Duration: 12 months (fixed term)
- Employment: 30 paid hours per week, including annual leave entitlements
- Schedule: 2 days of class + 2 days of workplace experience per week
- Supernumerary support: First 6 weeks of employment include extra supervision and support

Course Delivery

- Delivered by Federation University TAFE
- Includes 15 Core and 6 Elective Units
- Learning may be delivered via online (MS Teams), simulation/lab sessions, or blended formats
- Work placements: 120 hours in aged care environments across Grampians Health campuses

Pathways After the Program

Graduates may apply for personal care roles in:

- Public and private health services
- Aged care facilities
- Disability and youth support
- Community and home care settings

This qualification also opens the door to further study:

- Credit into the Diploma of Nursing Traineeship (up to 4 units)
- Up to 12 months credit into the Bachelor of Nursing at Federation University





Nurse

Nurses play a vital role in healthcare, providing direct patient care, administering medications, and supporting people's physical and emotional well-being.

Key Responsibilities:

- Assess and monitor patients' health, providing care based on individual needs.
- Administer medications and treatments as prescribed.
- Educate patients and families about health conditions and self-care.
- Collaborate with doctors and other healthcare professionals to ensure the best patient outcomes.
- Maintain accurate medical records and follow infection control and safety protocols.

Qualifications

To become a Registered Nurse (RN), you need to complete a Bachelor of Nursing at a university, which takes three years full-time. After graduating, you must register with the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA).

To become an Enrolled Nurse (EN), you need to complete a Diploma of Nursing which takes 18–24 months. ENs also need to register with AHPRA before practicing.

Both pathways offer opportunities for further study and specialisation in areas such as midwifery, emergency care, or mental health nursing.

Health Information Management

A Health Information Manager (HIM) is a health professional who works in hospitals and other health care settings to support health professionals to deliver high quality and safe health care.

This role suits individuals who would like to use information, data, records, technology, and health knowledge to assist and improve health outcomes but prefer not to be at the patient bedside.

There are various Health Information Management study pathways to suit all learners, including undergraduate, postgraduate, face to face and online learning. These are currently offered through La Trobe University and Queensland University of Technology.



Payroll

Payroll employees are responsible for ensuring employees are paid accurately and on time. The key responsibilities include:

- Salary and Wage Processing
- Compliance Management
- Record Maintenance
- Employee Support

The Grampians Health Payroll Department offers a structured career path, starting from a Trainee Level, where employees complete a Certificate IV in Payroll Administration. Career progression includes roles such as:

- Payroll Officer
- Payroll Specialist
- Senior Payroll Specialist

This career path supports ongoing professional development and provides opportunities for growth within the organisation.





Corporate Careers

Switchboard Operator

This role is the first point of contact for many coming to our health service! In addition to in-person reception and enquiry services to patients, carers, staff, and the community.

Key Responsibilities:

- Process and direct all incoming, outgoing, and internal calls.
- Announce emergency codes and assist the incident manager with communication.
- Provide reception and enquiry services, offering directions and assistance to patients, carers, staff, and visitors.

Allied Health Careers





Aboriginal Liaison Officers

Aboriginal Hospital Liaison Officers provide support to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people accessing care as well as during their time in hospital.

They work with First Nations patients, their families, carers and community by providing cultural support, advocacy, liaison and discharge planning. These positions are for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People and require knowledge of social determinants of health and an understanding of First Nations models of health care delivery, culture and society.

You do not have to have formal qualifications to begin your career as an AHLO but a willingness to undertake further study in Health, Community Development, Education, Disability, Project Management or Social Sciences would support your career development.

To succeed in this career, you'll need to be a good communicator, have the ability to build and maintain relationships to work collaboratively whilst fostering and promoting cultural safety.



Radiography



Radiography is a health care profession that uses imaging technology, such as X-rays, CT scans, and MRIs, to diagnose and monitor medical conditions. Radiographers operate these machines and work alongside doctors to ensure patients receive accurate and safe imaging.

Radiographers play a key role in detecting fractures, tumors, and diseases, helping doctors make informed decisions about treatment. Radiographers also educate patients about the procedures they undergo and ensure that radiation is used safely and effectively.

To become a radiographer, you need to complete a Bachelor of Medical Imaging. This degree usually takes 3-4 years full-time and includes both classroom learning and hands-on training placements of up to 24 weeks a year.

Meaningful Life teams at our Care Communities enrich the lives of our elderly residents through meaningful activities, social events, and outings. This non-clinical role within our Care Communities offers a unique opportunity to impact older adults' well-being profoundly.

Career Pathways and Educational Requirements

To embark on a fulfilling career in this field, consider the following educational pathways:

- **Entry-Level Positions:** Certificates: Cert IV in Leisure and Health – this qualification can prepare you for roles such as Meaningful Life Partner.
- **Management Roles:** Diplomas: Diploma in Lifestyle and Health or Diploma in Dementia Care. These qualifications and relevant experience can position you for roles like Meaningful Life Coordinator or Meaningful Life Manager.

If you're seeking a career that offers personal and professional satisfaction, consider a role in Meaningful Life. By dedicating your time and energy to enriching the lives of older adults, you can make a lasting difference.



Pharmacy

Hospital Pharmacists are medicines experts who ensure medicines are used safely and effectively. We work collaboratively with other health care team heroes to ensure that all our patients receive the best care, which includes the correct medicines at the right dose, while watching out for side-effects and interactions between medicines.

We provide education to patients and their families, as well as other team members. We supply and sometimes even make medicines. With extra training, and depending on preference, we can also specialise in different areas e.g. antimicrobials, cardiology, informatics, compounding, paediatrics – the list is endless.

To become a pharmacist, you will need to undertake a Bachelor of Pharmacy, the degree is 4 years, followed by a year of supervision (internship) before full registration as a Pharmacist.





Dietetics

A dietitian is a university-trained professional who applies the science of food and nutrition to promote health, prevent and treat disease to optimise the health of individuals, groups, communities and populations. Accredited Practising Dietitians (APDs) are nutrition professionals with at least 4 years of university training. They have the qualifications and skills to provide expert nutrition and dietary advice.

Dietitians work in a diverse range of settings, including health organisations such as hospitals and community health centres, clinics, the food industry, sporting bodies, research and media. Dietitians give practical, easy-to-follow advice. A dietitian can help to manage health conditions, such as:

- diabetes
- eating disorders
- food allergies and intolerances
- gastrointestinal diseases
- heart disease
- malnutrition
- obesity
- Kidney disease

Dietitians understand how nutrition affects the body so they can also help manage wellbeing at different stages of life, such as pregnancy, menopause and ageing. Using the latest scientific information, dietitians partner with clients to develop a personal plan to meet their needs.

Career pathway details

To study in Victoria to become a Dietitian you will usually need to meet an ATAR for an approved undergraduate university course. Prerequisites subjects at school are usually math, biology or chemistry.

It is extremely important that you select your undergraduate degree and electives carefully to make sure that you have completed the pre-requisite subjects to be able to apply for a Masters of Dietetics program.

Other states/territories in Australia may have different pathways to becoming a dietitian.

Social Work

Hospital social workers provide direct services to patients and their families/carers (including significant others) aiming to minimise the negative impacts of illness and hospitalisation. A hospital social worker's role is to enhance social and emotional functioning through targeted interventions and the mobilisation of services and supports.

Social workers draw on a broad range of skills, knowledge and research to ensure comprehensive assessment, interventions and a holistic analysis of the patient's situation. These assessments underpin needs-based and evidence-informed interventions that address the social and emotional issues that are impacting on the patient and their family/carer's health, wellbeing, adjustment and recover.

At Grampians Health we offer social work careers across all our campuses. The unique interventions we assist with: Risk assessments for child abuse and neglect, family violence, elder abuse & sexual abuse; Adjustment to illness and adjustment to new lifestyle counselling; Crisis assessment and intervention (eg. no fixed address, sudden trauma); Mediation and resolving conflict between family members/significant others regarding decision making; Advocacy, assist to navigate the health system to ensure social, cultural and emotional needs are met; Coordinating discharge and continuity of care; Bereavement, grief and Loss support/counselling; NDIA applications and processes; Guidance and information when dealing medico-legal matters; Assistance with the transition to supported accommodation.

We offer graduates a dynamic and innovative team environment of 40 plus Social Workers, providing opportunities for career progression. We provide a graduate program with structured support to consolidate both theoretical and practical skills in a range of clinical settings.

We offer extensive career pathways across our acute, rehabilitation and community settings including clinical areas such as musculoskeletal and orthopaedics, cardiorespiratory, neurology, babies and children, women's health, education, research. We offer individual and group supervision, communities of practice, professional development and journal clubs to assist in developing your career and knowledge.

University Requirements:

Social work is a tertiary-qualified profession recognised nationally and internationally. The Australian Association of Social Workers (AASW) is the key professional body representing social workers in Australia and is responsible for the accreditation of social work university programs. The academic qualifications that are accredited by the AASW include: a Bachelor of Social Work, Bachelor of Social Work with Honours, or a Social Work Qualifying Master's degree.

Exercise Physiology

Accredited Exercise Physiologists (AEPs) are university-qualified health professionals who prescribe and adapt exercise-based interventions to improve health, function, recovery, and independence. They support individuals across the health spectrum, from healthy individuals to those with chronic, complex, or age-related conditions. AEPs apply evidence-based clinical reasoning in various settings, including home, school, work, and the community.

To become an Exercise Physiologist, you will need to complete a four-year accredited Exercise Science (ES) and Exercise Physiology (EP) degree, or a three-year ES degree followed by a Master's in EP.

Why choose Exercise Physiology?

Physiotherapy

Physiotherapists work to improve people's quality of life, by providing services that develop, maintain and restore people's maximum movement and functional ability.

Physiotherapists work in lots of different areas, including musculoskeletal, cardiopulmonary, neurological, rehabilitation, pelvic health, lymphoedema, vestibular and paediatrics, and across a wide range of settings

To register as a Physiotherapist in Australia, you will need to complete a university degree: either a 4-year undergraduate program, or 2-year Master's program which requires a prior undergraduate degree. Both degrees include classwork as well as supervised clinical placements.

Why choose Physiotherapy?

- Highly rewarding career with the ability to make a tremendous impact on people's lives
- Diverse career opportunities and workplace settings
- High demand and good job security
- Strong team culture, with the ability to work with many other disciplines





Occupational Therapy

Occupational therapists (OT's) help people of all ages to engage in daily activities (or "occupations") that are important to them. These activities might include things like getting dressed, working, or participating in sports. As an OT, you will work with people who are recovering from injury, managing a disability, or dealing with mental health challenges, helping them regain independence and improve their quality of life.

OT's work across a wide range of settings, and at Grampians Health, you'll find us in:

- **Acute hospital settings:** Supporting patients recovering from surgery or illness.
- **Rehabilitation and aged care:** Helping people regain independence after injury or illness.
- **Community-based services:** Working with people who need support to live independently
- **Mental health services:** Acute, residential and community mental health programs

You will need to complete a university degree to register as an Occupational Therapist: either a 4-year undergraduate program, or 2-year Master's program which requires a prior undergraduate degree. Both degrees include classwork as well as supervised clinical placements.

Speech Pathology

Speech Pathologists diagnose and treat communication disorders, including difficulties with speaking, listening, understanding language, literacy, social skills, stuttering and voice. We work with adults and children who have difficulty communicating because of a wide range of reasons. Speech Pathologists also diagnose and treat swallowing disorders. We work with adults, children and infants who experience difficulties swallowing food and fluids.

Speech Pathologist's work across a wide range of settings, including hospitals, rehabilitation services, aged care facilities, and community-based health programs. We work with children or adults, sometimes both depending on where you are located. We provide speech pathology services to all sites across Grampians Health, including Ballarat, Dimboola, Edenhope, Horsham and Stawell. At Grampians Health, you will have the opportunity to work in various areas, such as the acute setting, rehabilitation, aged care and community settings.

Becoming a Speech Pathologist at Grampians Health is an incredibly rewarding career. We get to work with people across the continuum of care- from babies to the elderly. If you're passionate about helping others and have strong communication skills, this career path may be a perfect fit for you.



Career pathway details

University requirements:

To become a Speech Pathologist, you'll need to complete your high school education and focus on subjects that will prepare you for university studies. Recommended subjects include English, Biology, Health & Human Development and Psychology. These subjects will provide a strong foundation for the science and human health topics you'll study at university. You will need to complete a university degree in Speech Pathology. Some universities offer undergraduate programs while others offer a Master's program, which requires a prior undergraduate degree.

Podiatry

Accredited podiatrists are university qualified health professionals, who specialise in foot health, care and assessment. There are several areas of foot health this can cover including paediatric, sports and muscular skeletal injuries, orthotic prescription, high risk foot and general skin and nails issues of the feet including nail surgeries. They may work in several different areas such as public hospitals, the community or private clinics. There is the opportunity to graduate with prescribing rights for a certain set of medicines (depends on university).

To become an accredited podiatrist, you will need to complete a 4 year university degree, with both pre and postgraduate options.

Why become a podiatrist

- Wide range of specialty areas in public and private settings
- Flexible and good work hours
- High demand with good job opportunities and security
- Hands on job which is very clinical based



Allied Health Assistant

Allied Health Assistants (AHAs) are clinically responsible for undertaking a range of tasks (both clinical and non-clinical) led and guided by Allied Health Practitioners (AHPs). The AHAs can undertake delegated tasks from a combination of AHP disciplines. These tasks may include though are not limited to mobility training, upper and lower limb exercises, therapy groups, communication activities, malnutrition screening, and low risk footcare. Allied Health Assistants work in acute, subacute community and residential aged care settings.

Why choose to become an Allied Health Assistant

- Allied Health Assistant Certificate III or IV
- Grampians Health offers a traineeship program predominately aimed at school leavers. This program involves:
 - working four days onsite
 - theoretical learning at Federation University one day per week undertaking an Allied Health Assistant Certificate IV.





Prosthetics & Orthotics

A Prosthetist/Orthotist is a tertiary-qualified health professional who assesses, designs, manufactures and fits artificial limbs (prostheses) for people who have had a limb amputation and supportive braces, splints or shoe inserts (orthoses) for various musculoskeletal, neuromuscular and medical conditions.

At Grampians Health in Ballarat, Prosthetists/Orthotists have the opportunity to work with both adults and childrens across a broad range of areas such as:

- Acute care by providing orthoses for patients following an injury, surgery or other medical issue.
- Rehabilitation by providing prosthetic limbs for people following an amputation and orthoses to help people improve their mobility and function.
- Outpatient services for ongoing management, replacements and improvement of people's prosthetic limbs and orthoses to help to improve people's mobility, decrease pain, reduce skin pressure areas and/or support any muscle weaknesses

If you enjoy helping people, problem solving, biomechanics, product design and/or using tools then Prosthetics and Orthotics may be a career option for you.



Career pathway details

University requirements:

Prosthetics and Orthotics is a very small profession. There are only 2 universities in Australia where people can study to become a qualified Prosthetist/Orthotist:

- **Latrobe University (Bundoora)** – Bachelor of Prosthetic and Orthotics. Prerequisite subjects for this course are:
 - VCE: Units 3 and 4: a study score of at least 25 in one of Biology, Chemistry, Health and Human Development, Physical Education, Physics, Psychology or any Mathematics.
 - Units 3 and 4: a study score of at least 30 in English (EAL) or at least 25 in English other than EAL.
- **The University of the Sunshine Coast** – Bachelor of Health Sciences with an Extended Major Prosthetic and Orthotics

Psychology

Studying Psychology can provide opportunities to work in a wide range of interesting and challenging careers. Psychologists are experts in the understanding of human behaviour and apply this expertise in a wide range of settings including hospitals, community health settings, educational institutions, sporting clubs, organisations and many more.

At Grampians Health, we employ registered psychologists and psychologists with endorsement in Clinical Psychology, Clinical Neuropsychology, Health Psychology, Counselling Psychology and Forensic Psychology. Psychologists and Clinical Psychologists work across the community and bed-based services of Grampians Mental Health and Wellbeing Service. Clinical Psychologists, Clinical Neuropsychologists and Health Psychologists also work in the Allied Health Psychology Department. All psychologists apply their knowledge to assess, diagnose, and treat mental health conditions.

Psychologists are registered with the Australian Health Practitioners Registration Authority (AHPRA) by the Psychology Board of Australia (PBA). To be a registered psychologist you will need to complete an accredited undergraduate psychology degree followed by honors or postgraduate diploma plus either a 5th year of study and a 1 year internship (5+1 Pathway) or a minimum two-year Masters or combined Masters/PhD degree in an area of practice endorsement. To obtain an endorsement following the Masters degree you will need to complete a two-year registrar program in the same area of practice endorsement (eg. Clinical, Clinical Neuropsychology etc). *The Psychology Board of Australia is currently undertaking a review of the training pathways.

Support Services Careers

Food & Domestic Services Assistants



Environmental Services Assistants support the health service by providing cleaning and food services to ensure a safe and hygienic environment. This role involves meal preparation, food distribution, and maintaining cleanliness.

Key Responsibilities:

- Prepare and serve meals, including toast, porridge, and other required dishes.
- Distribute food and beverages, collect trays, and manage food trolleys.
- Set up kitchen and dining areas and clean dishes.
- Clean and sanitize toilets, basins, and other surfaces.
- Vacuum, mop, and spot-clean floors, carpets, and upholstery.

Qualification required

Food Handling Certificate
(HLTFS207C – Follow Basic Food Safety Practices).





Healthcare Worker

Key Responsibilities:

- Provide personal care and support to residents based on their care plans.
- Assist with safe medication administration under supervision.
- Support meal services and follow food safety guidelines.
- Maintain a clean and safe environment for residents, visitors, and staff.

Qualification required

- Certificate III in Individual Support, Certificate IV in Ageing Support or equivalent.
- Assist Clients with Medication (HLTHPS006), preferred.
- Follow Basic Food Safety Practices (HLTFSE001).



Laundry

This role involves performing various production duties, including sorting, ironing, folding, packing, and operating laundry equipment.

Key Responsibilities:

- Sort, iron, fold, and pack linen.
- Load and unload washers and dryers.
- Maintain cleanliness of the laundry area.
- Follow OH&S principles to ensure a safe work environment.

Qualifications Required:

None! In this role, you will get on the job training.
